Jesus' Arrest, Jewish Trial, and Denial by Peter

John 18:1–27 June 12, 2016 **Dr. Mark Strauss**

<u>Theme:</u> After Jesus' Farewell Discourse to the disciples at the Last Supper, events move rapidly. He leads them to the Garden of Gethsemane, where Judas arrives with a contingent of soldiers to arrest Him. Peter's passion and courage are evident as he lashes out with his sword in a misguided attempt to save Jesus. Yet the other side of Peter's personality also soon comes out—his wavering and impetuous nature—as three times he denies that he even knows Jesus.
