The Resurrection of Christ: The Climax and Confirmation of the Gospel 1 Corinthians 15:1–11 August 23, 2015 Dr. Mark Strauss

Theme: The last major theological issue Paul deals with in First Corinthians concerns the resurrection of the dead. Some of the Corinthians were denying the reality of a bodily resurrection. Paul begins by confirming the reality of Christ's resurrection, which assures us both of the truth of the Gospel and the reality of our future resurrection.
